- ❖ **Bronwen Densmore's presentation focused on Creative Commons (CC) licensing and using OA in teaching.**

- ❖ **Monica Berger spoke about Open Access Journals (OAJ)** [PowerPoint attached]
 - Clearing houses for OAJ include Sherpa Romeo <http://www.sherpa.ac.uk/romeo/> ; Ulrich's Web (available free via NYPL) ; Directory of Open Access Journals <http://www.doaj.org/> . These journals will also turn up in searches in google scholar and serials solutions.
 - CUNY publishes a library OAJ, *Urban Library Journal* <http://ojs.cunylibraries.org/index.php/ulj/index> The software behind it is called Open Journal System. Monica spoke about using OJS to publish the *Urban Library Journal* and demonstrated how it is administrated and functions. OJS requires some computer/technical knowledge and server access.
- ❖ The meeting concluded with a brainstorming session on publishing a textbook for CUNY information literacy (IL) instruction led by **Dorothea Coiffe**. Potential publishers, formats, and scope were discussed. The next step is for Dorothea to form a committee to gather syllabi from one-shot and credit bearing IL courses and assign editors.
