AN EDITORIAL

TODAY is our day!

It is the day that we have an opportunity to cast aside all lethargy, all party affiliations and sectarianism, to join forces in a nation-wide student strike demonstration against war.

It is the day we voice our denunciation of the insane armaments competition upon which the nations of the world have entered, and which can only result in the destruction of everything that we have come to look upon as civilization.

It is the day we show the war-makers that we are militantly more interested in living, than in dying for the safekeeping of their profits.

It is the day we protest against increasing nationalism and hatred, against the approaching menace of fascism with its glorification of war and subjugation of free thought and action.

We are about to add a glorious page to the history of student awakening in this country!

We are no longer to be regarded as playboys and playgirls with no thought for the injustices of a world gone mad. Today we will translate our convictions into forceful and courageous action. Strikes will take place on the campuses of high schools, colleges and universities from coast to coast.

At our own college, the Instructional Staff Association and Anti-Fascist Association of the Staffs of City College have gone on record as being in sympathy with the strike. Uptown, Dean Gottschall has declared that there will be no extra penalties for cuts. At the School of Business twenty-eight recognized undergraduate organizations are supporting the strike.

Members of the Senate Munitions Committee have openly declared themselves in favor of the strike.

Said Senator Nye:

"The student strike on April 12 is not futile, as some people seem to think. A strong demonstration will have the salutary effect of convincing jingoists of the task they will have on their hands if they attempt to force the youth of this country into another war. A unified and simultaneous movement on a national scale will have a far greater effect than has even been obtained by occasional independent outbursts."

Said Senator Clarke:

"Anything that tends to focus public attention on the implications of the munitions investigation is a good thing."

Said Senator Pope:

"I think that the demonstration against war to be made in an orderly fashion is a dramatic method of calling attention of the world to the fact that students are thinking about war, and opposing it. I see no objection to the strike."

We amend Senator Pope's declaration and say that only those who stand to profit from war, the Hearsts, the armament manufacturers, will object to the strike. And, it is exactly against these people and the wars they bring about that we are striking.

The day of limiting our activity to sterile academic discussions which cease immediately upon pressure from opposing groups is passing.

We are about to stage a demonstration so that the world can see that we have opinions and emotions against war, and are determined to interfere with our classroom schedules in order to get them across.

ORGANIZATIONS PLEDGE SUPPORT TO WAR PROTEST

Student Council, Anti-Fascist Ass'n, Clubs Vote For Strike

The Student Council of the School of Business was the first organization to lend its wholehearted support to the International student strike against war. By a unanimous vote at its regular meeting held March 8, the following resolution was passed: "Resolved that the Student Council of the School of Business, College of the City of New York, support the International student demonstration against war on April 12 at 11 a.m.

Anti-Fascist Association

The Anti-Fascist Association of the Staffs of City College, having already expressed sympathy with the international student demonstration against war on April 12, took definite steps to cooperate further with the student body at its last meeting held April 7th.

A resolution was unanimously passed urging "all members of the college staffs and the student body who are opposed to war, as an instrument for the settlement of international difficulties, to attend the anti-war exercises today."

Another resolution urged the "President of the College to make possible the dismissal of all classes meeting at the time of the demonstration."

Finally, Morris L. Schappes, of the English department, was empowered to represent the Anti-Fascist Association as a speaker at the student exercises if the students request such cooperation.

MADISON SQUARE PARK SCENE OF PROTEST

When more than 1,200 students of the School of Business leave their classes at 11 a.m., today and assemble at Madison Square Park, they will take part in the broadest, most militant most unified demonstration against war ever witnessed during peace-time.

At the same hour, on the campuses of hundreds of high schools and colleges throughout the country, students will gather in an orderly protest against the war that threatens the world today.

The entire campaign for the strike is being sponsored by organizations representing diverse viewpoints, which have joined forces on a common basis in this attempt to outlaw war. They are the National Council of Methodist Youth, the Inter-Seminary Movement (Middle Atlantic Division), the National Student League, the Student League for Industrial Democracy, the American Youth Congress and the Youth Section of the American League Against War and Fascism.

At the School of Business, the strike will take the form of an organized walk-out at 11 a.m. to gather at Madison Square Park opposite the Metropolitan Insurance Company Building, where speakers will address the meeting.

Mr. Arnold Shukatoff, a member of the downtown English department and faculty advisor to the Student Council, will head the list of speakers. Mr. Shukatoff will address the gathering as a representative of the Anti-Fascist Association of the Staffs of City College. Lawrence Cohen, editor of THE TICKER, and Joe Warren, captain of the wrestling team and president of the Student Council, will present the student viewpoint.

In addition to the undergraduates of the School of Business, students of the Social School for Workers, Washington Irving High School, Townsend Harris High School, and the 32nd Street branch of Hunter College, will convene in Madison Square Park.

Throughout New York City, which is the spearhead of the drive for peace, fifty thousand students are expected to leave their classes to participate in the protest. Five thousand students will strike at Columbia University. At Hunter College, Brooklyn College, N. Y. U., L. I. U., and Seth Low similarly successful strikes are predicted.

Tonight several thousand students of the evening session of City College uptown will strike from 8:25 to 9:25 at the flagpole. Strikes at City College Commerce and Brooklyn College evening will also be held.

The city-wide action was begun Wednesday morning when some fifteen hundred students of George Washington High School and DeWitt Clinton High School left their classes. They had been unable to participate in the nation-wide strike because of conflicting mid-term exams.

According to Main Events, weekly newspaper of City College evening session uptown, President Robinson, as well as Dean Gottschall, has stated that he is sympathetic toward the ideals and the principles behind the strike. Dean Gottschall has further expressed the hope that "the movement would have the support and co-operation of all student groups and of the members of the teaching staff as well."

When asked for a statement of opinion on the strike, Dean Justin H. Moore had nothing to say.

At 23rd Street the strike is being conducted under the leadership of the Students' Rights Committee, which is composed of delegates from the twenty-eight campus organizations which have supported the strike.

The Students' Rights Committee has urged all students of the School of Business to strike at 11 a.m. today. The committee agrees with the United Parents Association which it says "it seems fitting that one hour be granted to our young youth in which they may express their desire to avoid future wars, inasmuch as days are set aside in memory of those who gave their lives in wars of the past."
