Introduction:

This reading will walk you through the social and political structures of Ancient Greece and Athens, the most important city-state during this period. A city -state is an independent city that operates like a small country. It has a government, a law-system, and its own military. Compared to Mesopotamia, Athens demonstrates how the city had brought organization of society to a new and complex level, both culturally and politically. In this reading you will also observe how writing offers humans a powerful tool to keep records, maintain a powerful administration, a legal system and finally, a unique form of government. As you explore the reading, think about the following question: How do we know these facts? Which scientific disciplines are involved in uncovering history and human cultural evolution?

Ancient Greece - Describe, Define, Explain

The reading on Ancient Greece is concentrated on a lot of important concepts that we still use in our modern government systems today. In fact, many of the words you will come across are of Greek origin and part of our everyday language. For example, we all use words like police, politics, metropolitan, democracy, pharmacy etc. daily without thinking of it as Greek. Further, this text and exercise will help you understand the value of defining and explaining a concept or an idea. When you try to define a concept and explain it in your own words, you not only understand it better, but you utilize your own vocabulary and language skills to express the meaning of the idea or the concept. It is important to use as many words as possible on a regular basis to make them “stick”. With a passive knowledge of vocabulary, meaning you do not actively use it, you often use the same words repeatedly. This exercise will help you explore and test different words so you become comfortable expressing complex ideas in words you eventually will feel are your “own”.
