REPORT.

COLLEGE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, }
December 18th, 1876. }

To the Board of Trustees of the College of the City of New York :

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with the 19th section of the Manual of the College, the Faculty respectfully submit this, their Annual Report.

Congratulating the Board of Trustees upon the success of the College, under the present management, during the past year, they point with pleasure to the gradual increase of the number of students.

The Faculty would, therefore, respectfully recommend your careful consideration of the official statement of the number of students in the several classes, appended to these remarks.

The number of students requiring admonition or punishment is as small as usual.

The catalogue of the Library (of which about 300 pages, now printed, can be submitted to you for inspection and criticism) will do credit to the College, and will make a well-deserved reputation, for ability and faithfulness, for the Professor who has had charge of the work.

The following is his report of the number of books in the Library :

On Commencement Day (June 24th, 1875), there were on the rolls of the institution 1,006 students, classified as follows :

At the beginning of the sessions in September, one (1) student was transferred from the Junior to the Senior Class, and one (1) from Sophomore to Junior, and one (1) from Freshman to Sophomore.

During the first term four (4) students were transferred from the Freshman to the Introductory.

The number of students who left, or were dismissed, during the first term, ending January 28th, 1876, was—

As a result of the examinations in February, one (1) student was transferred from the Junior to the Sophomore, one (1) from the Sophomore to the Freshman Class, and seventeen (17) from the Freshman to the Introductory Class, and one (1) student was admitted to the Introductory Class.

During the second term, ending June 22d, 1876, there left, or were dismissed—

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The Examination for Advancement lasted from June 2d to 12th, inclusive. When the results had been ascertained, forty-three (43) members of the Senior Class, and one of the Senior Class of 1875, were recommended to your Board for graduation. Of the Junior Class, fifty were advanced; of the Sophomore, fifty-seven were advanced; of the Freshman, eighty-two were advanced; of the Introductory, one hundred and fifty-five were advanced, and seventy-eight were graduated from the Commercial Department.

The Examination for Admission took place May 29th and 30th. Of the 695 applicants 524 were admitted into the Introductory Class.

On Commencement Day, June 24th, 1875, the Senior Class graduated forty-three, leaving 1,050 on the rolls of the College.
