COURSE DESCRIPTION:

3 hours. 3 credits. An examination of the nature of live theatre: its forms, practices, and purposes, and its relevance to society.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

*Analyze in writing and/or in a presentation the development of drama and theatre in human societies and cultures.

*Create and believably portray characters using a variety of acting styles involving the use of the body, voice, and imagination.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

The Lehman College Student Handbook notes that “Students are expected to attend all class meetings as scheduled, and are responsible for all class work missed as a result of late registration or absence. Excessive absences in any course may result in a lower final grade.”

Attendance is recorded starting at 12:30 pm. If you arrive after your name has been called, if you leave before the end of class without having made prior arrangements with me, or if you leave the classroom for more than 5 minutes while class is in session, you

are counted absent for that day. If you arrive after attendance has been taken, you can see me in person immediately after class to request that your absence be changed to a lateness. I count your total number of absences over the course of the semester and do not differentiate between “excused” and “unexcused” absences.

The effect of absences on your course grade of a possible 100 points:

Zero absences = plus 2 points

1 absence = no penalty

2 absences = minus 2 points

3 absences = minus 5 points (half a letter grade)

4 absences = minus 10 points (full letter grade)

5 or more absences = minus 15 or more points (one and a half or more letter grades)

Keep in mind that you can also accumulate absences by arriving late, leaving early, or spending time outside of the classroom while class is in session.

The effect of lateness on your course grade of a possible 100 points:

Never late: zero instances of lateness = plus 2 points

One time: 1 instance of lateness = no penalty

Occasionally late: 2 instances of lateness = minus 2 points

Frequently late: 3 or 4 instances of lateness = minus 5 points (half a letter grade)

Chronically late: 5 or more instances of lateness = minus 10 points (full letter grade)

Keep in mind that if you arrive after attendance has been taken, you will have been counted absent for that day and must see me in person immediately after class to request that your absence be changed to a lateness.

Not being present or not being on time does not excuse you from keeping up with the syllabus, and you are encouraged to check with your classmates to find out what you missed. If you are repeatedly late or absent due to personal reasons, I can help refer you to free and confidential on-campus support services for students. Please reach out to me sooner rather than later if you need support of any kind.

Class participation:

Your participation in classroom discussions and activities is worth 10 points of your course grade of a possible 100. I determine your participation grade by observing your level of preparation and engagement. When you come to class, you are expected to have the assigned reading material and/or notes you took while reading available to you and to be able to demonstrate that you have completed the assigned reading. If I have to ask you during class to take out a text that was assigned for that day, if you cannot discuss the

assigned reading, if you don't ask questions and take notes, and/or if you engage in activities not related to the class, I assume that you are unprepared, and I will grade you accordingly for class participation.

Use of electronic devices in the classroom:

If I get the impression that you are using your electronic devices for purposes unrelated to this class, you risk getting all points for class participation taken away, which is 10 points of your course grade of a possible 100. I observe student behavior, but I do NOT always issue warnings to students who conduct non-class-related business on their phones, laptops, or tablets. As a result, if you use your electronic devices for non-class-related business in my classroom, you can expect to lose 10 points of your course grade, whether I speak to you about this in person or not.

“My Grades” on Blackboard:

You can check your grades for individual assignments AND my comments on your graded work in the “My Grades” section on Blackboard. If I leave a comment that asks you to take action before I can grade an assignment, you have 48 hours to do so from the time the comment was posted. If you do not take action within 48 hours, your assignment will not be considered for a grade.

Quiz Deadlines:

All Blackboard quizzes are due no later than 11:59 pm on the day **before** our next class meeting. Students may take each quiz once. There are no makeup quizzes, but your lowest quiz grade will be dropped. Please only take Blackboard quizzes AFTER completing the assigned reading. Since you only have ONE opportunity to take each quiz, do not take quizzes using unreliable internet connections and do not take quizzes on

your phone. Please note that ANY quiz throughout the semester can also contain one or more questions about the class policies described on this syllabus.

Homework Assignment Deadlines:

All homework assignments are due on Blackboard no later than 11:59 pm on the day **before** our next class meeting. Assignments will only be accepted if they are turned in via the appropriate link on Blackboard. Printouts or emailed work will not be accepted.

When you turn in work on Blackboard, it is your responsibility to ensure that you upload the correct file in .docx or .doc format. **I do not accept other formats, including .rtf, .odt, and .wps files, and I will post a zero for work when I cannot open a file.** You can make unlimited upload attempts before the deadline of each assignment. If you upload more than one version of the same assignment, I will only grade the last file you uploaded. Uploading the “wrong” file first does not make a Blackboard assignment on time if you do not follow up with the “correct” file before the assignment deadline. Always save a copy on your computer or flash drive of any work you plan to upload to Blackboard, and never type directly into Blackboard without having created a backup first.

What if you miss a deadline? If you work right up to an assignment deadline and then miss the Blackboard cutoff for any reason, your work will be considered late and graded accordingly. Emailing me your paper a few minutes after the deadline or bringing a printout to class does NOT make your work on time. The only way to still get partial credit if you miss a Blackboard assignment deadline is to use the “late” assignment link on Blackboard to turn in your work.

If you need to submit a writing assignment late, you can do so until one week after the original due date, but your grade for your late assignment will be reduced by one letter grade from what it would have been had your work been turned in on time. There will be a separate link on Blackboard for turning in late work, which cuts off exactly one week after the original due date. “Late” links are contained in the same Blackboard folder where the original assignment was posted. This one-week extension/grade reduction is the only option to still receive partial credit for a missed assignment and does not apply to quizzes or presentations.

Example: If you did not turn in a writing assignment that was due by 11:59 pm on Monday before a Tuesday class, you can still turn it in up to one week late, but you must do so no later than 11:59 pm the following Monday. Keep in mind that late work will receive a one-letter-grade reduction. If you write a B+ paper but turn it in up to one week late, your recorded grade for that paper will be a C+.

Presentation Upload Deadlines:

When you are scheduled to participate in a presentation, you must upload your presentation-related homework to Blackboard no later than 11:59 pm the day before your presentation. **Students who upload their presentation-related homework on time, but then do not participate in their scheduled presentation, OR students who do not upload their presentation-related homework on time, but then participate in their scheduled presentation can receive a maximum grade of 1 out of a possible 4 points (1 point is equivalent to a grade of D) for their presentation.** Students who arrive late on the day of their scheduled presentation may not be permitted to present and/or will receive a lower grade. Once a presentation date is confirmed, you cannot reschedule it.

Make-up assignments/extra credit:

Towards the end of every semester, some students who have missed deadlines for assignments approach me to see whether they can make up missed work. Please note that the opportunity to submit written homework assignments late for a lower grade expires one week after the original assignment deadline. There are no “extensions” beyond that, and missed quizzes or presentations cannot be made up. If you are concerned about your progress, please set up an appointment to speak with me in person. The earlier in the semester you reach out, the better I will be able to help you.
