The examination for admission commenced July 10, and ended July 18, 1856.

Four hundred and thirty-three (433) candidates were presented from the various Ward Schools of the city for examination. Of the number examined, three hundred and seventy-five (375) were admitted as having passed a good examination in those studies proscribed by the rules regulating the admission of students into this Institution; and fifty-eight (58) having been found deficient, were rejected.

Of those admitted at the said examination, one hundred and ninety-eight chose the study of the Ancient Languages, and one hundred and seventy-seven chose the Modern Languages.
