Beavers Smash Brooklyn

Score 35-11 Win Lewis Article

Lavender Reserves Show Power—Jayvee Tops Brooklyn, 19-15

Unleashing the full power of a versatile attack, the Beaver hoopsters smashed a hopelessly outclassed Brooklyn College team 35-11, in the Lavender gym, last Saturday night.

Both the second-string and the first-string men showed a strong superiority over the bewildered Kingsmen, with a series of amazing scoring plays.

Sol Fleigel led the attack with 12 points, two of which were gained by a superb long-shot from mid-court.

At the end of the second half the score was only 13-8, as the first-stringers had seen little action. With the entrance of Fleigel, Cohen, and Schneiderman in the second half, the Holmen swung into play and had the Brooklyn boys on the run with their perfect passing and team-work.

With the score 26-8 in favor of the Beavers Coach Nat Holmar sent the second team back into the game and the boys completely vanquished a frazzled Brooklyn five, the final whistle marking the end of a complete rout.

The excellent work of the Beavers in their zone-defense augurs well for the ascendancy of the once brilliant but now faded City star.

In the preliminary game a green J.V. five indicated a wealth of power when they bashed the Brooklyn freshmen 19-15. Kaufman, Trachtenberg and Adler each contributed four points to lead in the scoring.

Will Set up 5S Booth, Carry Fight to Board

FOLLOWING a declaration by Herbert Robinson, president of the Uptown Student Council, that "the Main Center student body had no intention of removing its booth in the Alcove, even though Dean Turner had requested it", the Student Council, last Friday, unanimously voted to carry on similar activity here, and set up a booth in its Social Room, 5S, to collect food and clothing for the Spanish Government, during the course of the week.

Robinson had been invited to the Council meeting to inform the members of the Main Center's future plans in the Spain Drive. He stated that the Council had received a communication from Dean Turner, were functioning, requesting that they be taken down.

"The college authorities claim that it has been the custom to prohibit collections in the school with the exception of the Red Cross," Robinson declared. "But according to precedent the students have taken it upon themselves to set up booths for the collection of money for outside interests and have not been interfered with. It is obvious, Robinson continued, that Dean Moore is applying pressure upon the Uptown administrative authorities to attempt to prevent us from continuing our collections for the aid of the defenders of the Spanish Government."

The Council also established a committee consisting of Jack Kalish, '37, Ed Weitzen '38, and Jerome Soffer '37, to present its case against the Board of Higher Education.

Culminating the week's activities, the Social Functions committee, headed by Hal Spierer, is planning a "Save Spain Swing" in 5S, Friday at 2 p.m. Admission will be an article of clothing or a can of evaporated milk.

Senator McNaboe Sees "Red" For Above Cayuga's Waters

Senator John J. McNaboe was attacked from liberal and progressive quarters last week following the release of a statement in which he asserted that Cornell University was a "center of revolutionary communistic propaganda."

Senator McNaboe, who is chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee to Investigate Communism and Subversive Activities in the Schools and Colleges of the State, was challenged after the McNaboe release by a member of his committee, Senator Jacob H. Livingston, as to his right to issue statements without the sanction of the committee as a whole.

Dr. Livingston Farrand, President of Cornell, called Mr. McNaboe's statement an "indirect attack on the whole spirit of free inquiry, of free discussion, and of free assemblage."

Others Score McNaboe

Meanwhile, the American Student Union, one of the organizations at whom the inquiry is aimed, declared that Mr. McNaboe had "proved the partiality of his investigation by releasing the findings before any open hearings had been held or any real inquiry made."

Assemblyman George W. Stewart, a committee member, substantiated this assertion by announcing that there had been no meetings of the committee, and that no evidence of any sort had been brought to his attention.

The Cornell Daily Sun, student newspaper, invited Mr. McNaboe to address an undergraduate meeting and explain his charges. Charles J. Hendley, president of the Teachers' Union, which McNaboe also attacked, scored the investigation as "typical of McNaboe and Hearst methods."
