The examination for admission commenced January 19th, and ended January 28th inclusive, 1852 :

One hundred and ninety-nine candidates were presented from the various Public and Ward Schools. Of the number examined, sixty-seven were rejected, and one hundred and thirty admitted, as having passed a good examination in all the studies prescribed by the rules regulating the admission of Students.

Of those presented who were not examined, one was rejected, being under age, and one for non-appearance at the examination, making the whole number of rejected, sixty-nine.

Of those admitted, twenty-seven were from Public Schools, and one hundred and three from Ward Schools, as follows :

The new Students were informed, previous to making their choice, that they were permitted to commence their course by studying the Latin, the French, or that they might omit both of these languages ; yet no one expressed any wish to commence and pursue strictly an English course, or any part of it, without a daily recitation in one of the languages named above.

In respect to the general state and condition of the Free Academy, during the past year, the Faculty would report, that the conduct of the Students has been, in the main, good, and their progress satisfactory. A general disposition has been evinced to conform to the rules and regulations of the Academy. There has been of course a diversity in the proficiency of the Students, yet, generally, it may be said of all, that commendable progress has been made in the various branches taught in the Institution. Although this report shows that quite a large number have left to enter upon other pursuits, yet it is believed by the Faculty that there is an increasing desire on the part of the Students to remain in the Academy until their full course of studies is completed. It will help to make this object still more desirable in their estimation if some final testimonial of honor shall be conferred upon those who do not leave until they have gone through the prescribed course of study.

The Faculty are more and more impressed with a sense of the importance of this Institution and its bearing, not only on Common School education,—tending to elevate the standard, and furnish incitements to correct and well-grounded scholarship,—but on the cause of science and learning in general, belonging, as it does, to the great sisterhood of institutions furnishing instruction in the higher departments of education. They have endeavored to keep this great mission of the Free Academy ever in view, and to train the youth committed to their care to habits of correct deportment and intellectual discipline, answering to the munificent provision

made by the city for their instruction. They have regarded this as a great educational experiment, the success of which may stimulate other cities to found kindred institutions, and the failure of which would be in the highest degree disastrous to the cause of free education. Such have been, and continue to be, the sentiments of the Faculty; and to the welfare of the Institution, so long as they are personally connected with it, they are ready, as heretofore, to devote their time and energies.
