
Following our conversation at this office last evening, I am writing to say that having examined the sketches which you have prepared, I feel assured that with the background of practical experience as a practicing Architect, you have developed a well balanced, comprehensive scheme for the proposed College, and could undoubtedly do an excellent piece of work if you were commissioned as Architect. The buildings as you have shown them have character quite suitable to a college, and are well disposed on the site.
