Dr. Robinson Resigns Post; Served 11 Years

The resignation of Dr. Frederick B. Robinson as president of the College of the City of New York was unanimously accepted last week by the administrative committee of the Board of Higher Education.

Dr. Nelson P. Mead, acting president in Dr. Robinson's absence, is now in a position to succeed Dr. Robinson. However, Charles S. Tuttle, chairman of the administrative committee of the Board, announced that no attempt has been made, as yet, to name a successor to Dr. Robinson.

Dr. Robinson, who had been earning a salary of \$21,000 a year. Although it was generally conceded that Student and Faculty pressure forced Dr. Robinson to resign, the resignation came as a surprise to all.

At that time Mr. Flynn said: "If I have anything to do about it, you won't be here next year." Mr. Robinson, who is 55, was appointed to the presidency in 1927, the first City College alumnus ever to hold the post.

ICC Endorses SC Drive For 2 Extra Free Hours

Endorsement of the Student Council proposal to set aside two additional hours each week next term for extra-curricular activities was voted Thursday by the Interclub Council.

A dinner committee has been set up to prevent conflicts between club dinner dates and to secure information as to prices. Program and Publicity Committees have been appointed to assist in arranging joint meetings between clubs, coordination of publication dates of club magazines and issuance of publicity.

Collective Security Retained By ASU As Keynote Of Peace Program

Pre-convention discussion for the fourth national American Student Union convention were almost completed on Wednesday when the Commerce A. S. U. Chapter decided to continue a policy of 'collective security' as the means to insure world peace.

Eleven delegates were elected to represent the 23rd St. branch in the convention. They are Henry Foner, George Weissman, Gerold Estrin, Sam Engler, Terry Cooper, Irving Cohen, Sam Sadin, Terry Grable, Al Friedman, Stanley Beckerman, and Jordan Zier.

First on the peace agenda was a resolution calling for the adoption of the Oxford Oath, which called for a refusal of American citizens to bear arms in any war in which the United States may be involved, as the peace program of the A.S.U. It was defeated in favor of the 'collective security' policy.

A second motion was then introduced favoring a limited U. S. armament program and opposing alignment of WPA funds for military purposes.

TU To Fight Harris Abolition

The College-Townsend Harris space problem came to an abrupt head last week when the Executive Board of the Teachers' Union unanimously passed a resolution condemning the proposed closing of Townsend Harris High School.

The reasons were given in explanation of the Union's stand, namely that: (1) Since Townsend Harris is performing such significant progressive educational work in the way of providing especially adapted educational programs, its closing would mean educational retreatment, a policy to which the Union is strongly opposed.

By following the above course of action, the Union made it clear that it is not washing its hands from the entire problem. According to Mr. Goldway of the Harris staff, the Union merely opposes the abolition of the school.

Seldman Emphasizes 'Interests'

The common interests of teachers and labor and the necessity for labor-teacher collaboration were emphasized Thursday by Dr. Joel Seldman, vice-president of the American Federation of Teachers.

Too many teachers, according to Dr. Seldman, consider themselves professionals rather than white-collar workers. Hence, they refuse to join unions and instead join "professional associations" which are often dominated by school officials.

And then it happened!

With the score 30-36, Al Scoupias sank a sensational shot and City led 33-39. This proved to be the beginning of the end. The Beavers put in five more points and thus had a 7 point margin. With minutes remaining, Oregon started making shots from all over the court. Three times they split the cords, thinning the Beaver margin to one slim point. Thirty seconds remained and the Lavender boys fought desperately to hold their lead. And again it happened! John Dick, Oregon player was awarded a free toss by referee Pat Kennedy. Not a sound could be heard as Dick approached the foul line, poised and then tossed the ball at the hoop. Around and around it rolled and finally fell to the floor. City still led 37-38.

Then with 10 seconds remaining, Babe Adler was given a free toss. He made it! The bell sounded, thus giving City College a 38-36 victory and Nat Holman one of the sweetest Christmas presents of his career.

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## Students Save \$300 In Co-op Store This Year

City College students will save approximately \$300 this year through the reduction in the prices of merchandise sold in the College Co-op store, it was announced by the College Store Committee on Friday, November 18.

In accordance with the plan, prices will be decreased from one to ten per cent below their former level. The mark-up on books will be only 8%. In this way, a book costing \$2.40 will be sold for \$2.50 in the Co-op Store, whereas outside dealers ordinarily charge \$3.00.

## Credit Men Offer Essay Prizes

The National Association of Credit Men is sponsoring the Fourth Annual Tregoe Memorial Prize Essay Competition with the aim of developing a "greater appreciation of sound credit principles and practices."

The choice of subject is unrestricted within the limit that it is related to some phases of credit practice or policy or shows the relationship or importance of credit to general business and economic life.

Awards for winning essays will be announced at the 44th Annual Credit Congress of the Association at Grand Rapids, Michigan, in June 1939. First, second, and third prizes are \$100, \$40, and \$20 respectively.
