Did you read?

The New York Times of October 16, 1933 which reported the future Mayor LaGuardia as stating that- "The argument that free higher education was not a city obligation was not applicable to the city" that- "There was no intention to go

backward in the matter of providing college facilities for the students of N.Y.C."

That the \$35,000 appropriation for books for the city college has been rescinded, but that the Banker's Agreement under which the city pays \$179,000,000 every year, or \$40,000 every two hours, remains in full force?

Did you know?

2- These petitions from every class should be presented by a committee chosen from that class to President Robinson and Dean Gottschall on Wednesday, Feb. 13, at 1:00 PM.

3- Following this, a committee representing all classes should be set up to continue the campaign for free books for all classes in City College.
