For many, the Student Caucus was the first gathering where they had a sense of "belonging." Some of us from collectively-run programs shared our perspective that student decision-making can help incorporate feminist ethics into the student/teacher relationship.

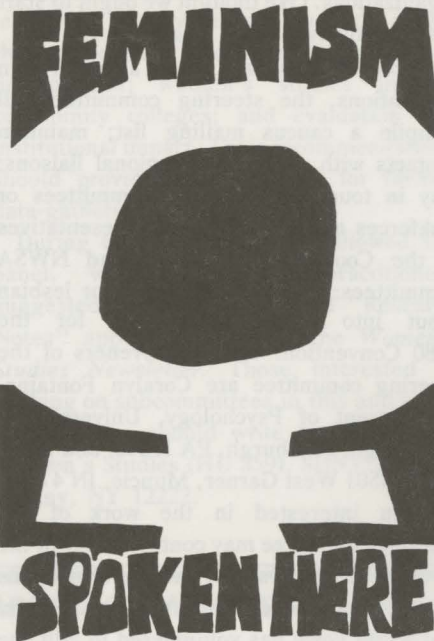
