## Presidents Council Included in Club Activities Revision

Plans calling for the establishment of a Council of Presidents were presented to Student Council at Friday's meeting. The plan was part of the proposed revision of the club activities program.

According to the proposals a Council of Presidents would meet once a month and discuss matters pertaining to the welfare of the club activities on campus.

Organizations wishing to have club privileges such as publicity and appropriate would be required to send representative to the meeting.

The week Council was presented with a plan for a club governing body called Activities Revision Board. The board would have an ACB chair and six coordinators.

At its continued discussion of proposals Council made several changes. All privileges were granted to all sub-chairmen attending ACB meetings. In addition, a representative from each club would have speaking privileges on later amendments.

## Mercury Not to Publish This Term

Mercury, the City College humor magazine will not publish this term, it was learned by THE TICKER last week.

Mercury editor, Judo Delatorre, senior at the uptown center, said that the magazine has had to reject a lot of good material which might be considered risqué.

### No Controversy Wanted

He explained that he didn't want the publication to get into a controversy concerning objectionable material.

"But, when you look at Mercury of the past, the great ones were ribald," he added.

Robert Stein '47, editor of Mercury Call's, and a member of the Mercury Advisory Board of Alumni, suggested to Delatorre that the magazine should not publish until "good material" is obtained.

An additional difficulty that Mercury faces is a \$400 debt to its printers. Delatorre said: "It's not that we can't print. It's just something we can't push into."

"We have a sufficient amount of ads, about \$200 worth. Us-

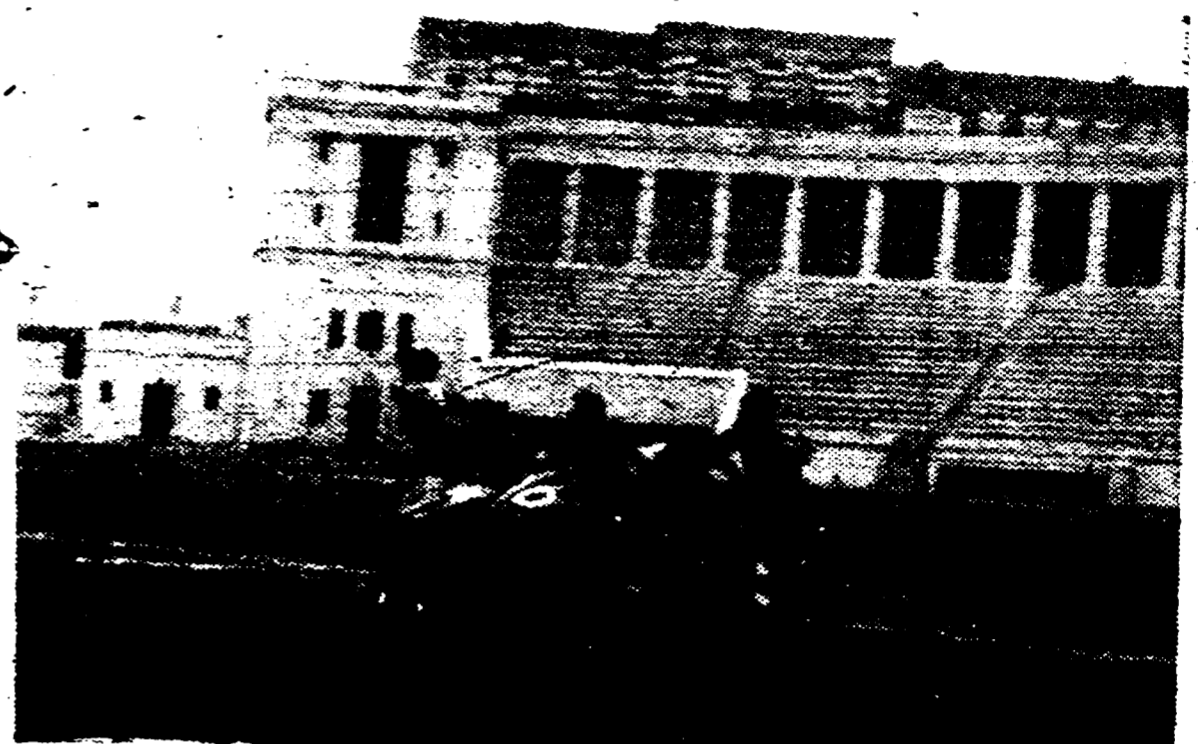

ually a hundred dollars is enough for us. But a lot of these ads are conditional and have to be printed by a certain time. In other words, if we don't print them, we lose them."

Delatorre emphasized, however, that Mercury will be on sale by the second or third week of the spring semester.

As if taken from the pages of a Frank Merriwell story, the City College soccer team scored with 27 seconds left in the final quarter, to defeat Williams College, 1-0.

Marco Wachter, who scored the goal, redeemed an afternoon of ineptitude. In a flurry of opportunities, the Beavers finally managed to get into a favorable position for Wachter to make the shot.

Before play started, general consensus showed Williams' soccer team to be "tough, and good." They looked fast and powerful, and many of the players were big. Defense had been their forte in the regular playing season, as they never yielded more than one goal per game to their opponents.

In the opening minutes of play,

the Beavers dominated the field. Williams had trouble just getting possession of the ball, as the Beavers passed crisply and accurately to one another.

Ten minutes after play began, City goalie Andy Houtkrayer made a brilliant diving stop of a Williams shot to ward off a goal.

Coach Harry Karlin, along with most of the observers noted that it was a "beautiful game," thus far, after the first quarter. The score then stood at 0-0, as it did until Wachter's dramatic shot.

As the second period got under way, Williams made one offensive play after another, but the Beavers were brilliant on defense as they stopped every play.

Beaver fullbacks Claude Spinoza and Les Sofney were matchless as they seemed to be everywhere on the field at once, blocking shots, and keeping the ball away from City's goal.

The Beavers had a decided advantage from playing on their home field. Aside from the familiarity associated with all home games, Lewisohn Stadium has an unusually wide soccer field.

Most opposing teams are unfamiliar with a wide field, and usually tire in the course of a game. This seemed to happen to the men from Williams as time advanced in the game. They did not run as much as they had previously.

Shortly after the half-time break, as play began, Wachter, the eventual "hero" of the game, was injured in a play, and suffered a cut on the side of his face. He was taken out of the game for a short while, while Baruchian John Costalas replaced him.

After being treated, Wachter re-entered the game, and stayed in until completion.

In the third quarter, the Beavers were pressing Williams con-

On the basis of faculty salaries, with the implication that high salaries enable a school to attract a superior teaching staff, we are again at the top (p. 283). For the intangibles of course content and teaching effectiveness there are no objective standards of measurement, but we have no reason to believe that we are lagging in these respects.

One further thing you should know. We have not been, we are not now, standing still. Continually prodded by Dean Saxe with his ever-repeated "we must improve, improve, improve," we are constantly reexamining, reappraising, revising our curriculum, our courses, and our teaching methods. We are amply aware that there are broad areas of further improvement still ahead of us. Heaven help the Baruch School if we should ever become complacently satisfied with what is! So we shall still go on working towards that never-attainable goal of becoming the "perfect" collegiate school of business.

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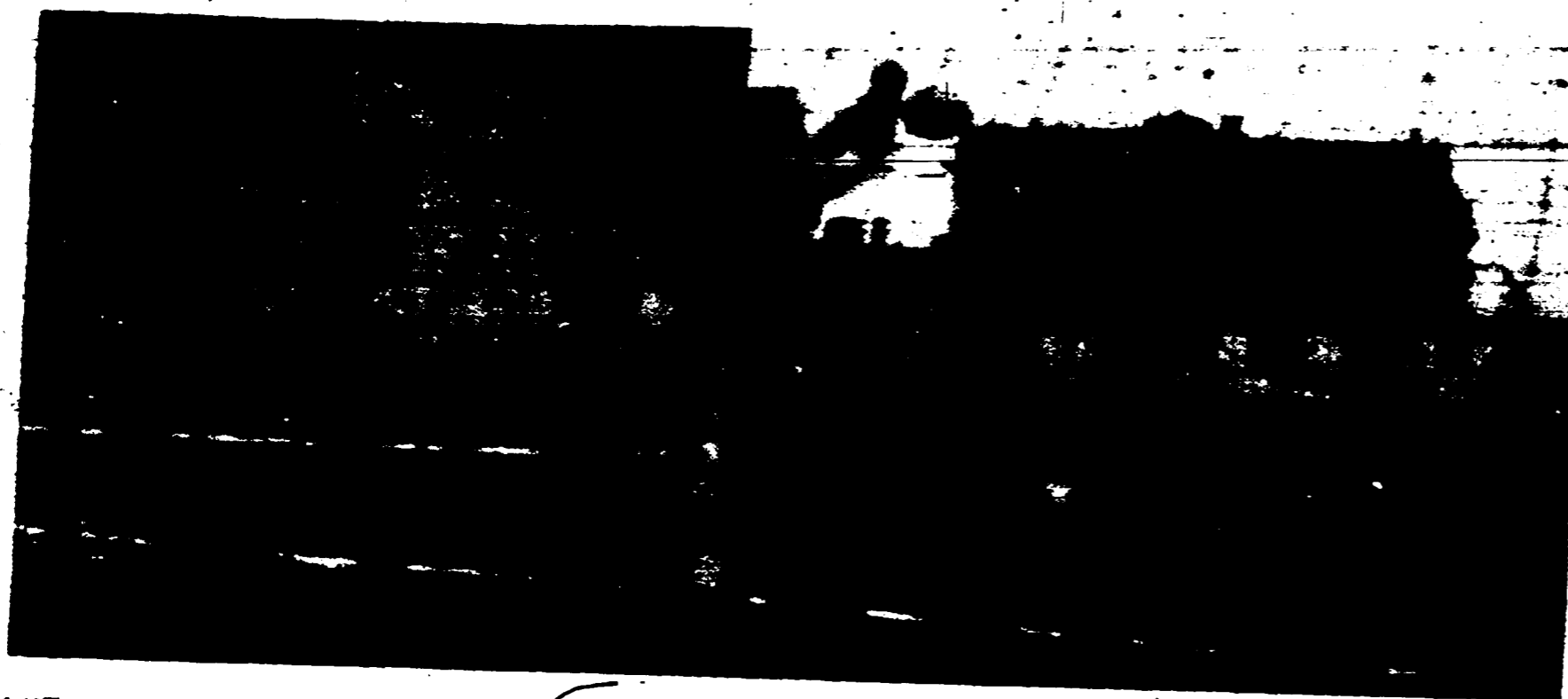

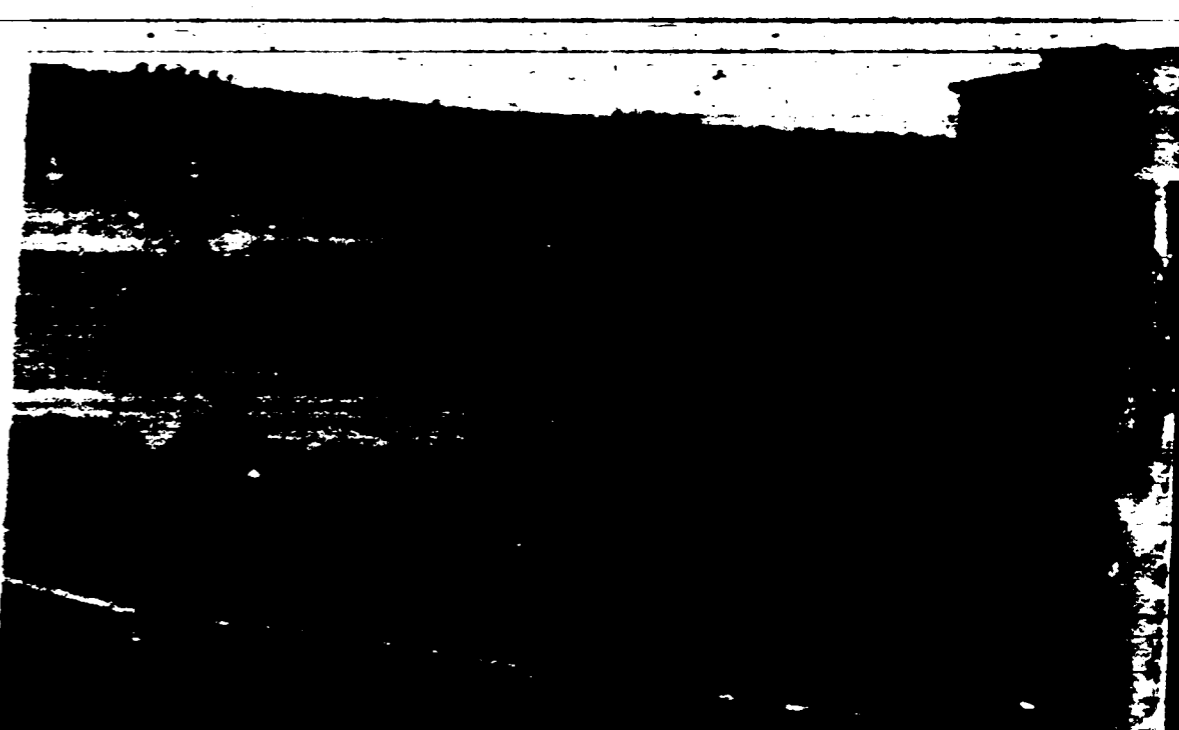
