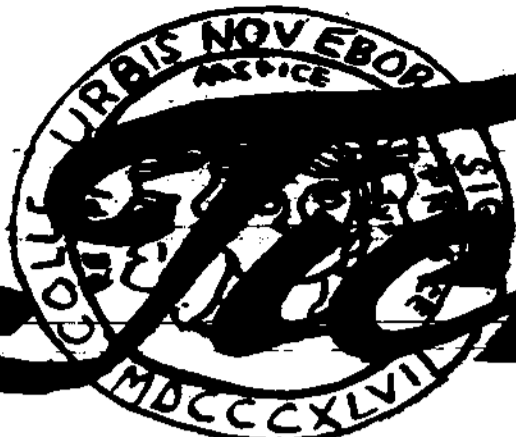

Podoff, Heneghan, Klein, Bress Win; Students Endorse NSA, 365-347

Dave Podoff, Brendan Heneghan, Ken Klein, Dean Bress, Bob Brooks and Ken Peskin will constitute Student Council's executive board next semester. Bobbi Jarmolow was elected as one of three Baruch School N.S.A. delegates. The student body, in a close vote in yesterday's school-wide election voted 365 to 347 to continue affiliation with the National Student Association.

Siegel, Sodikoff Victors In Senior Class Races

Andrew Siegel was elected the president of next semester's senior class in yesterday's school-wide election. He defeated Mel Jacobs with a vote of 115 to 78.

In the contest for vice president, Joe Sodikoff was elected with 76 votes to 63 for Enid Schoen and 51 for Sherry Kershner.

Martin Sanders triumphed over Edward Satran with a vote of 93 to 85 in the race for Class of '62 treasurer. Sue Forman, the lone candidate for class secretary, polled 196 "yes" votes and 15 "no" votes.

In the election for Student Council seats, Daniel Cohen received 150 "yes" votes and 34 "no" votes. Arnie Sadoff came in with 138 in favor and 41 against; Leonard Marks polled 146 "yes" to 34 "no"; Richard Ellison received 138 "yes" to 29 "no"; and Leonard Forman came in with 138 in favor and 40 against.

Barry Epstein polled 80 votes

to become president of the Class of '63. His opponents, Paul Dann and Arnold Gittell, received 58 votes and 51 votes, respectively.

In the vice presidential election, Mike Kreitzer polled 152 "yes" to 32 "no." Lynn Tashman received

'Ethics and Economics' Discussed By Gallagher

President Buell G. Gallagher addressed the 114th annual Charter Day Convocation on the topic, "On Ethics and Economics" yesterday in Pauline Edwards Theater.

During Dr. Gallagher's student days the country was scandal ridden, but instead of turning to communism as some of his fellow students did, he said he began his research into what has since proved to be "a continuous interest in ethics and economics."

According to the President of City College, "Ethics is the science of morality; economics is the science of wealth."

Dr. Gallagher said that he spoke in the hope that one student would listen and perhaps devote himself "to the ethical issues of economics." He feels that much has been done in this field, but much more remains to be done.

The President stated that some students believe that a business career has three steps: to get on, to get on-er and to get honest. However, Dr. Gallagher maintained that "The difference between selfishness and altruism is as between night and day."

To stress the importance of ethics in economics, Dr. Gallagher cited two examples. The first was the 116-day steel strike of 1959-60. During the strike he was on the National Council of Churches' committee studying the strike. This committee published their report, "In Search of Maturity in Industrial Relations" and in it they

Paul Pruzan '62, president of the Intramural Board, in the race for the vice presidency. Heneghan polled 544 votes to Pruzan's 279.

Ken Klein '62 won for the position of treasurer. He totalled 341 votes to defeat Artie Fisch '62 with 263 and Mary Herskowitz '62 with 198.

Dean Bress '63, in the uncontested race for recording secretary, received 711 "yes" votes and 98 "no" votes.

Bob Brooks '63, news editor of THE TICKER, for the position of corresponding secretary, totalled 707 "yes" votes and 91 "no" votes.

Ken Peskin '62, unopposed for the position of A.C.B. chairman, received 665 "yes" votes and 112 "no" votes.

Bobbi Jarmolow '64, the only candidate for N.S.A. delegate, polled 464 "yes" votes and 323 "no" votes.

Michael Kreitzer '63 defeated Norman Ross '63 in the race for the single vacant seat on the Insignium Committee. The vote was 375 to 351.

'Corps' Parley Set Tomorrow

Dr. Charles J. Eberhardt, dean of curricular guidance, will be the principal speaker at the session.

Grace Named 'Man of the Year'

This year's Foreign Trade Society "Man of the Year" award will be presented to J. Peter Grace, President of W. R. Grace and Company, at a dinner tonight at Fraunces Tavern.

Mr. Grace's contributions in the field of foreign trade include the launching and carrying through an extensive program of expansion in existing and new fields in Latin America and the United States.

Although his major concentration has been on the development of his company's chemical program, he also directs the management of the other phases of the enterprise's business. These other interests include Latin American industrial, agricultural and commercial enterprises, ocean shipping, banking, insurance and air transportation.

Mr. Grace's career as an officer of W. R. Grace and Company started in 1942 when he was elected secretary. A year later he was named one of the company's di-

rectors, and in May, 1945, he was elected a vice president. Mr. Grace assumed the presidency of the firm four months later, in September, 1945.

In addition to the presidency of W. R. Grace and Company, Mr. Grace is a director of Grace Line, Inc. Other directorships which he holds are in Ingersoll-Rand Company, Assurance Company of America, Stone and Webster, Inc., Northern Insurance Company of New York, Brazilian Traction, Light and Power Company, Limited and Kennecott Copper Corporation.

Yale is Mr. Grace's alma mater, from which he was graduated in 1936.

In the field of education, Mr. Grace is a vice chairman on the Board of Lay Trustees of Notre Dame University and on the Board of Lay Trustees of Fordham University, a member of the Board of Development of New York University and is affiliated with other educational institutions.

Wagner Triumphs, 8-2; City Retains Last Place

Al Di Bernardo's nine suffered its fourth consecutive setback by bowing to Wagner College, 8-2, at Grymes Hill, Staten Island Tuesday. The loss gave City a 2-8 league record, leaving the Beavers in last place in the Metropolitan Collegiate Baseball Conference.

C.C.N.Y. hopes to regain its winning ways against Queens in a non-league affair at Alley Pond Park today at 5. Following this game, the Lavender travels to Hempstead to play Hofstra Friday and visits St. John's on the Creedmor State Hospital field Saturday. The latter two games are league encounters.

Wagner's powerful first baseman, Jim Powers, blasted a three-run homer in the first inning to pace the Seahawks' attack. The loss was Friedman's sixth of the season against one victory. City also had seven hits, but committed six errors to one for the victor. Friedman, a sophomore formerly from Monroe High School, pitched capably once again, but his chances for victory were hampered by ineffect fielding earlier in the season. Friedman lost a squeaker to Wagner, 8-7.

The winning hurler was Jim Marino, who went the route, walking six batters and striking out seven to even his record at two wins and two losses.

Against Queens, the Beavers may face the ace of the Knight's mound corps, Jeff Maloney. The strong southpaw has already pitched a no run, no hit game against Brooklyn College earlier this season. The final score was 12-0. Queens, the third place team in the Knickerbocker Conference, has a 6-3 league mark.

Hofstra also presents a formidable foe for the Lavender, although the Flying Dutchmen are in the second division of the league. In City's opening game, the Long

Islanders won a 5-0 shutout, with Dennis D'Oca receiving credit for the victory.

The Dutchmen were league champions last year, but the loss of several standout players has prevented them from making a repeat performance. However, Hofstra has retained the services of pitcher-outfielder Brant Alyea, who is batting well over the .300 mark.

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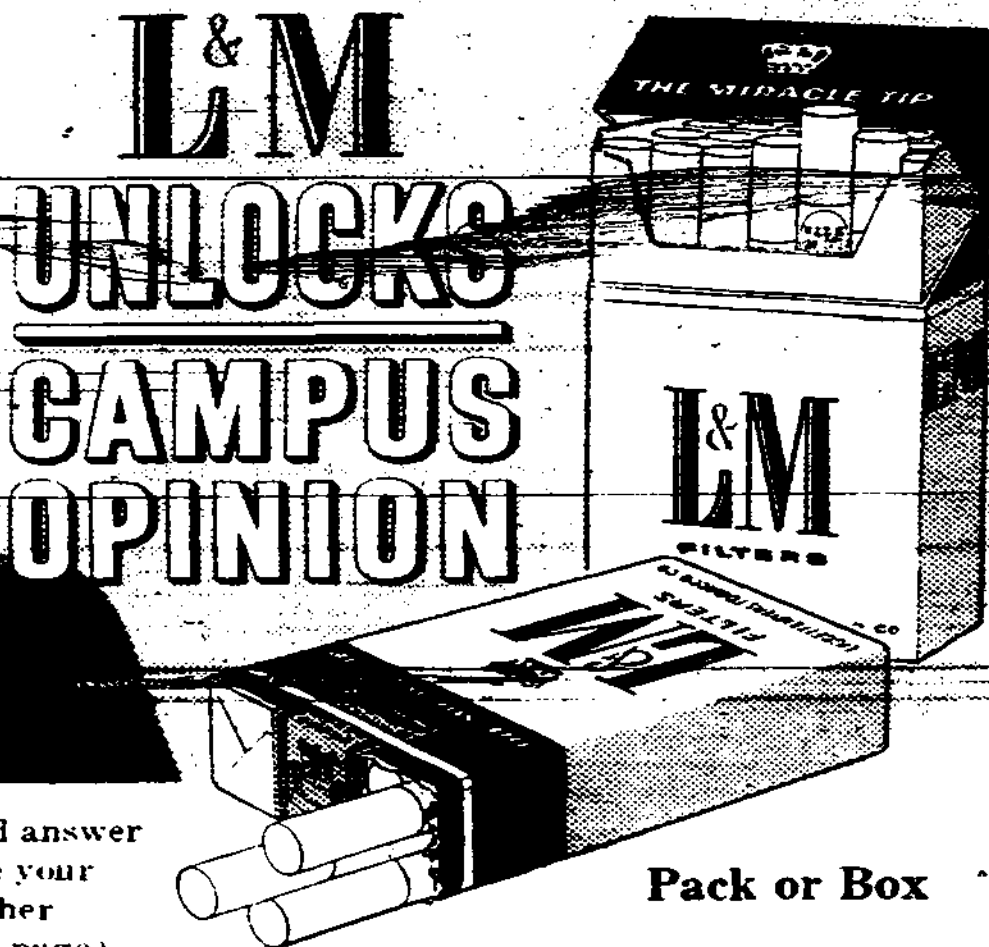
