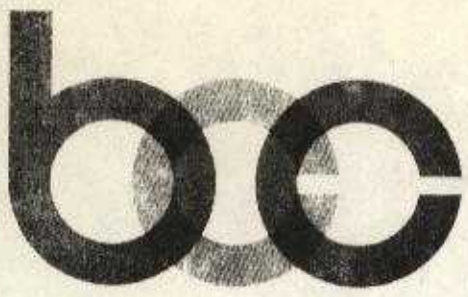


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MINUTES OF COMMITTEE ON INSTRUCTION, TUES. MAY 4, 1976

Suggestions from various members present, included the following.

- 1) Bring in guests from other colleges as speakers.
- 2) Find friends who would talk on instruction - as voluteers, since the Committee has no budget.
- 3) Brainstorming in a retreat for educators, such as Glenmont.
- 4) Student Parody of Instruction.
- 5) Reverse Role-Playing
- 6) Bulletin Board exclusively devoted to Instruction.
- 7) Occasional one-page bulletins, distribution of cartoons on instruction to the faculty etc.
- 8) All day Conference on Instruction.
- 9) A series of lectures on the psychology of learning.
- 10) Invitation of "Great Teacher Award" recipients to come and give talks on instruction.
- 11) Solicitation from the faculty any suggestion on instruction.
- 12) Provide a forum for student complaints regarding instruction.

In conclusion, members of the Committee present agreed that the agenda for the next meeting should include an item on how the Instruction Committee may use its power effectively.
